A Broken Heart

The heart is essential to our life, pumping oxygenated blood throughout our body. But it is more than just a pump. It also the place where we experience many of our feelings — from a quickening beat when we see our loved one after a long separation, to a painful pause that happens when we hear bad news. It is to be determined which reacts first to situations causing emotions and reactions: the mind or the heart. The mind normally looks at events or things logically and rationally. But at times, there is something that overrides our mind and makes us think, feel and respond in an emotional and at times illogical way.

Even the Bible relates emotions and the will of man to the heart. “For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.” Matt 6:21 “For out of the heart proceed evil thoughts.” Matt 15:19, “The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked: who can know it?” Jer 17:9

“The first known depiction of a heart as a symbol of romantic love dates to the 1250s. It occurs in a miniature decorating a capital 'S' in a manuscript of the French Roman de la poire. The "scalloped" shape of the now-familiar heart symbol, with a small dent in its base, arises in the early 14th century, in the miniatures in Francesco Barberino's Documenti d'amore. The modern indented heart has been used on playing cards since the late 15th century. That's why the condition is also called stress-induced cardiomyopathy, or broken-heart syndrome.” health.harvard.edu/heart-health/takotsubo It can be fatal.
