We recently took our granddaughters there. We rode the log flume, antique cars, bumper cars, scenic skyride, tea cups, train ride, carousel, motor boats, and whipper. We then got to the 110-foot tall Ferris wheel. The girls and I got in and sat down. The seating was not the standard bench with a bar against your lap. It was an open round car with half-moon benches around a center wheel. There were no seat belts nor bar to keep you secure. The ride started and the girls figured out that they could turn the car by spinning the wheel. Then the car started to rock back and forward. Looking out the car at the highest point, I realized that the small chain on the car entrance was not going to keep us in. I started thinking, "We are going to fall out and die." I started praying and asking the girls to sit down and stop moving the car. We all became scared because the ride had stopped with us at the very top and it was really rocking. One of the girls looked over the edge to see why we were stopped. She saw that they were helping a disabled person on to the ride. We finally started going again but we kept yelling "We want off." I was totally afraid of dying that day.

It is a fact that every one of us will die. We do not know when or how. We may be able to prolong its coming but we cannot avoid our appointed time. We can prepare our loved ones with life insurance and wills. We can preplan our burial and service. But, most of us are afraid because we have no knowledge of life after death.

"The statement "There are no atheists in foxholes" is an aphorism used to argue that in times of extreme stress or fear, such as during war (in foxholes), all people will believe in, or hope for, a higher power." ² The one subject an atheist cannot and will not argue with you is life after death. They have no answers or hope.

"The fear of dying is so common that it has spurred multiple research projects and intrigued everyone from scholars to religious leaders. There is even a field of study called thanatology which examines the human reaction to death and dying. According to the 2017 "Survey of American Fears" conducted by Chapman University, 20.3 percent of Americans are "afraid" or "very afraid" of dying. It is possible to break down this fear of death into several specific types of fears: Fear of Pain and Suffering, Fear of the Unknown, Fear of Non-Existence, Fear of Eternal Punishment, Fear of Loss of Control, and Fear of What Will Become of Our Loved Ones."
