## Joseph

As a father of two sons. I often wondered what it would be like to be the earthly father of Jesus. With what Joseph went through; he has the right to be called a Saint. He was given the responsibility to take care of Mary and raise the Christ child. Wow. This Christmas let's try and put ourselves in his shoes.

A God-honoring young female, named Mary was engaged to Joseph. He was also a God-honoring man. He was a descendant of King David. But Mary had a situation. She was expecting a child and she had to tell Joseph. Joseph was taken aback, hurt, upset, mad, and had a hard time believing the story that the Holy Spirit caused Mary to be pregnant with the Son of God. To save face, Joseph was going to have Mary put away privately. According to Jewish law, she was to be stoned to death before the child was born. But an angel then came to Joseph. The angel said that the story that Mary told was true. Now Joseph had a bigger issue. Does he believe the angel and disobey what he had been taught? Was this just a bad dream? Who could he ask? Who would believe him? What would people think about moving up the wedding? Would they figure out that the baby came too soon? By faith, he put away his feelings and fears. He trusted and acted on what he believed was God's plan.

But then, there want out a degree that all the world should be taxed. Since Joseph was from Bethlehem, he and Mary had to go there. He was quick to make answer to what he perceived to be the direct call of God. Joseph is known to us only as a dim figure in the background of the Gospel narratives, yet his whole-hearted reconciliation to Mary, even in the face of possible slandering's by his neighbors, his complete self-sacrifice, when he left all and fled into Egypt to save the infant Jesus, are indicative that he was not unworthy to fulfill the great trust which was imposed upon him by the Eternal Father."
