The leather got so thick that he could nail pieces of leather onto the shoes without feeling the prick of the nail's point. At the end, the pair of shoes weighed 18 pounds. The shoes were bequeathed to Reineberg's when the hobo passed away. In the 20s, or maybe the 30s, Ripley's Believe It or Not wrote up the shoes as one of those stories that was too weird to believe."
