## **Trowels**

It seems like every year, there is a project at my house that requires cement. This year is no exception. The curbing in front of my house needed repairing. I went to the local hardware store to buy two bags of cement mix.

While there, I overheard a conversation between a young unmarried woman and a salesman. She explained that she hired a person to make a 10 x10 cement slab. The contractor told her that she had to purchase the wheel barrel to haul the cement from the street to her backyard. The salesman asked, "Normally, the contractor provides his own wheel barrel. Is he going to make you haul it also?" She replied, "Yes." The salesman said, "There is no way that you would be able to do that. Is he going to pay you to do his hauling? I would find a different contractor." She did not purchase a wheel barrel because she could not find one that would fit in her trunk. That was the honest truth. She is really having a needless trail with her slab.

Now with my repair, I first used cement that had small stones to give it strength. I used a trowel to apply the desired shape and thickness. Then I used the trowel to semi-smooth it and remove the rough stones from the surface. Then I removed the forms and used the mix, without the stones, to fill in the missing areas and the rough surface. I again used the trowel to apply and smooth the surface. Like icing on a cake, you have to go over and over it with a trowel to get it just right.
